**DIES IN THE HILLS,
 SUDDENLY STRICKEN**

**Guy B. Higgins Succumbs to
 Appendicitis While Out
 Hunting**

After being carried down a tortuous
 trail from the Sunset Mining Com-
 pany's mine, twelve miles outside of
 the town of Sultan, on a crude, impro-
 vised stretcher, and placed in a wagon
 and started for Sultan, Guy B. Hig-
 gins, for nearly ten years employed in
 the composing room of the Post-Intel-
 ligencer, died Wednesday afternoon
 when he had gone only one of the

eleven miles at the end of which
 proper care and medical attendance
 could have been given him. Death
 was due to appendicitis.

Accompanied by H. H. Hine, super-
 intendent of construction of the In-
 dependent Telephone Company, who was
 a personal friend, Mr. Higgins went to
 Startup last week to spend his annual
 vacation hunting, going into the
 mountains from that point.

On Monday he became ill near the
 Sunset mine, and with Mr. Hine he
 remained in a cabin there all that day
 and Tuesday. Wednesday morning
 Mr. Hine became alarmed, as his
 friend's condition seemed to grow
 worse rather than better, and he got
 a miner named J. W. Kellar to walk
 the twelve miles to town to summon
 medical attendance. Dr. A. B. Clough,
 of Sultan, responded to the urgent
 call.

There was no way of getting a rig
 up to the cabin in which Mr. Higgins
 lay, so Dr. Clough, Mr. Hine, Walter E.
 Hayden, Mr. Kellar and J. F. Herfinger
 improvised a stretcher and bore him
 down the two-miles-and-a-half-long
 trail to the rough wagon road. It re-
 quired three and a half hours to get
 Mr. Higgins to the road.

Dr. Clough gave Mr. Higgins opiates,
 which relieved his pain in a measure.
 The doctor is of the opinion that had
 medical attendance been within reach
 of Mr. Higgins when he was first
 stricken, the appendicitis would not
 have been fatal.

Mr. Hine brought the body of his
 dead friend back with him last night.
 It is now at Butterworth & Sons'
 morgue.

Mrs. Higgins is visiting her parents
 at Weiser, Idaho, and Mr. Hine wired
 her at that place, apprising her of her
 husband's death. She will arrive in
 Seattle this afternoon.

Mr. Higgins was about 40 years old,
 a native of California, Mo. He came
 to Seattle nearly eleven years ago,
 and after working in various printing
 shops in this city he came to work for
 the Post-Intelligencer, filling the po-
 sition of assistant makeup man at the
 time of his death. Only his wife sur-
 vives him, there being no children. Mr.
 Higgins lived at 532 Broadway north.
 Plans for the funeral will not be made
 until Mrs. Higgins arrives.
