Its a gorgeous photograph of your home with a winter setting. And I am sure you are very proud of the painting. What a talented friend and neighbor you have. The style of your house is very much the same as many of the new homes in Phoenix and throughout Arizona. Ernie and I had talked of a ranch home (just talked) but decided all the good looking ones were entirely too large for two people and the problem of finding someone to help with the work. There just aren't any folks around here willing to do domestic work and the ones who will are not worth hiring. Oh Well, the smaller the house, the less work and less of a problem. There are so many thieves and robberies here, especially if you leave on vacations that when one comes home from a trip, they are never sure just what they will find left in the house. Two years ago, when we were away at Christmas two teenage boys jimmied one of our windows and got in and took quite a few things. They both came from good families and lived in the neighborhood. We have learned our lesson and now when we leave for two or three weeks, we store our TV Set. We have a 21" Colored set and would hate to have some one carry it away. Its done every day in this town.

Well, to get back to the other Hulburd Family. It must be exciting to have three active boys around the house and how happy you must be. Something exciting every minute. Its strange to hear you talk of Maine. You always seem so close and yet Maine sounds so far away. We have been in most of the states, except the North East. They always sound so cold but it must be wonderful country. We haven't been East since '39 when we visited the New York Fair. It would be a real delight to see your family and also Harriet's but outside of seeing you all, we just haven't any desire to go East. The West to us is all so wonderful and we are never tired of it. We are so close to California and

our own state has many beautiful things to see and enjoy. We have been all through our State many times but always marvel at the georgeous (maybe I should have stayed with a pen) gorgeous scenery and places to visit. Even Mamie Eisenhower has discovered our State. They will probably make her beautiful.

We had a wonderful Christmas Holiday. Being with my sister was a treat for all of us and then getting once again in the North and snow country was something for us coming from a Southern climate. We had just enough snow to get a thrill out of it and yet not too unpleasant. We didn't drive, but too a train as we both enjoy trains. We were glad we didn't attempt to fly as the weather was so bad all the planes were grounded and we couldn't get a plane out for Green Bay.

I had almost forgotten until Ernie reminded me. When we were in Yosemite last July, your Dad's Aunt Lula died. You will remember, she used to live in Moberly and had moved to Trenton when your Dad passed away. She was really Ernie's and Henry's Aunt but Earl thought a lot of her. Remember we discussed whether we should tell of your Dad's death to her and decided not to. Well after the funeral, some one told her and her daughter wrote us asking why they were not notified. She was a lovely old lady and we always marveled at her sweet disposition and her interest in life. She was quite old. I believe in her late eighties. We felt badly about not being where they could get in touch with us as we certainly would have attended the funeral. Also, my sister in Kansas City passed away about the same time and we were not notified until our return. Of course we would not have been able to get back from Yosemite to Kansas City for the funeral as we were driving. She was badly crippled with Arthritis and it affected her heart.

We love hearing from you, Betty and would love to have a visit with you.





I know you have too much pride and spunk to let it spoil your life. You have your boys and I am sure you will always have them to turn to and love.



September 27, 1965

Dear Betty,

This is a most difficult letter to dictate as my bursitis will not let me write or scribble. You will know it is an awful ordeal.

In the latter part of June I suffered a terrific accident by falling, caused by the weakened condition of 'flu recovery' and broke my back and it was a complete fracture. Fortunately we have excellent bone specialists here and very complete treatment facilities so I did not have to shuffle off to Mayo's in Rochester, Minn. After nearly three months strapped in bed I was permitted to take a few steps with help of cane or nurse. I guess I am a tough guy as I am now surprising my several specialists by my (what they call) a good recovery.

When in bed and could hardly move "dear Alice" suddenly passed away (a bowel block). I tried to locate you in St. Louis with your address and phone number but the phone company and my friends did not have any success so you now know the reason for me getting so delayed in advising.

The Bells Lodge meets my every treatment and nursing needs so am happy in the thought that God is really helping me along the road to almost a complete recovery.

Please do not worry a bit as my financial and business affairs are in perfect and excellent condition and I can not want for the least care or item.

Now it comes to me as to all men. My lawyer prods me and says I should give my "Will" attention right now. My attorney is Wayne Legg Of Phoenix and Mesa, Arizona. His law partner is John Rhodes, our congressman from Arizona. Heswill write you as I have nobody else to write to as I do not know where your sister Harriet is at present. Atty. Legg will want certain data as to you and sister Harriet. I imagine he will only want correct present legal name and address. Be sure your sister Harriet gives you the data he wants promptly because I want her as a beneficiary also. I have no other living close relatives that I know of.

Data as to records and location herewith. The Hulburd Crypt #310 is in a section described as "The Garden of the Lillies" in the Mausoleum. Crypt #310 contains Alice Lillian Hulburd's casket and #310 also contains casket of Ernest Albert Hulburd. Alice made the selection of Crypt #310 about four years ago when she had a choice in the new mausoleum being built. The "Will" is filed with the Valley National Bank & Trust Co. Please remember 'well' that everything has been paid for in full as A. L. Moore Mortuary have complete records and the State of Arizona supervises such transactions and contracts very strictly and all expense money is in the bank. Alice even arranged for professional pallbearers.

Alice's dear friend Mrs. Toothaker has typed this for me. Bursitis, stiff fingers and hands (me no write) see!

He was of the opinion that natural flowers were bad for my allergy.
