Horace Resley Coudy

Letters Regarding His Ancestors and Relatives

Compiled by Ted Hine - April 2004

The following 3 letters were written by Horace R. Coudy to his grand-daughter Betty Hulburd-Hine in the 1940s. Fortunately she saved them and they were recently discovered among her collection of family history papers and photos.

In the letters he discusses some of his relatives and ancestors. Much of the information he provides is all that is know about these individuals.

In the first letter (September, 1943) he discusses feeling alone since by then he had outlived his wife and all of his 4 children. (In 1943 Horace would have been 81 years old.) The reference to Harriet is to Betty's sister and that to Bud is to her brother. All three were living in or near New York City at the time and thus far from Horace's home in St. Louis.

The second letter (April, 1946) discusses, among other things, his Seward ancestors and provides just about all that is know about his father, Matthew Coudy, who he indicates was born in Maryland to parents who had immigrated from France (with a stopover in Ireland).

In the third letter (October, 1946) he provides just about all the information that is know about his wife, Harriet Varner Shipley-Coudy and her family.

The last document is a typewritten page in which Horace summarizes his Seward ancestors.

Since aunt Edith passed away last any 3 pt he has just about given up, he cannot go out alone, I take him for a walk but the weather has been so bad, mucle repton and family are well at present dam enclosing are sending by Parcel Post Some few thing I have such as uncle Elmer, norman + Harold's Photo's when they were young, I have no one left to give them to look them over and destroy when I am gone. also Pictures of Dati. my G. S. Smandfather on my mother's Dide (Caroline Seward) was bol John Deward

an aide de comp to Ben Seo Washington for whose capture the offered a 20 Pound reward this information was furnished me when I applied for membership in the Da. P. of which I am a member - my Sit & Father bolgohn Deward was in the mexican War * my Grand Frather was Col. I grack Deward. my S. F. married margaret Slayback of Leington Ky. a Sister of bal aw Slaybace who when I was a young man was a member of the Taw firm of Braadhead, Slay back and Hanesler, the leading Legal firm in Mories. my mather's bousin Um of Deward was a Candidate for President but was defeated by abe Lincoln for the nomination, after Lincoln's election he appointed mm 26 Deward Secy of State (he was my 2nd consin-Ibazels- 3rd 36 n. + yours + Budi 4th) W. H. S. suggested. brugalaska from Russia in 1867 and the U.S. paid Seven million and it was called "Deward's folly", but in 3 years \$45,000,000,00 in Sold was taken from the country (alaska), I am sending you shot's Itaat in Sept. 1939 at Hillston Ill of my S. So they walked only 40 miles grass taller than Heads. arrived in Hellsboro in due time then had to go on to my to there Israel Deward who was in charge of Turding, Frather often told us when he went up to House mother a young girl of about 16 was a riding pale, any way they built the academy - (Still Standing Sowit in 1938) abe I meden always Stopped at 3. F. on his way from Spring field, to Vandalia which was then the capital of Ill, mother said he would drive up in a Buckbard, - dashboard culout so his leg could reach around the Horse's heck, ha'd jump out throw her up + catch her in his arms. Uncle Oliver married a Hillsboro girl and passed away some years later in the coach on his way from springfield

where he was a Legis later from his district. later his Hidow married Judge Rice its rand thildren still living in Hillsboro Father + mother married in 1848 moved to Alouis bought, half a block of Land. built à Home, went into contracting business and later built eight more houses, when I was 12 yrs Father retired, passed away Dec 31st 1883 - I went to send a Telegram to uncle James at Hancok md and when I returned Mother had a Telegram Stating rucle games passed away at 10m. Father at 12 hour - 1 hour aparl. Father 70 - Wirele James 80 Could write a Book Betty but am tonervous your devoted Grandfather Look over what I mail you by Parcel Pool. HORACE R. COUDY

I am the great great grand son of Col. John Seward, born 1730- died 1797, of Summer County, New Jersey, and Mary Swazey of Long Island, New York.

I am the great grand son of Col. John Seward (of the War of 1812) who was born in sussex County, N.J., and his wife Mary Butler, also of New Jersey.

I am the grand son of Israel Seward of New Jersey, born 1795, and Margaret Slayback of Lexington, Kentucky, born 1798 -- married in Hamilton, Ohio in 1817.

I am the son of Mathew Coudy (born 1813) and Mary C. Seward (born 1827)

My two sisters are members of the St. Louis Chapter D.A.R. on this same
line of descent; -- Mrs. A. H. Eilers
Mrs. B. P. Corneli

John Seward served as Captain, 2nd Regiment, Sussex County, N. J., Lt. Col. February 28, 1777 and Colonel of same regiment.

He was at the battles of Ft. Washington, White Plains, Princeton and Flatbush.

He was so obnoxious to the Brittish that a price was put on his head.
